Mosques traditionally host a variety of functions, religious and cultural. Troguht the history mosque have been in the heart of cities. Function and worked as a community center. Mosques around the world have adapted to their vernacular, cultural and climatic conditions, and local building materials for centuries.

Mosques in today's Norwegian society are growing out of their untraditional spiritual spaces while including more cultural activities but are facing a number of challenges such as lack of spaces, funds and symbolic presence in the city argues against the traditional sacred space.


W H A T

With this project, I want to explore how mosques can deal with different challenges.

By working with this context, witch have similar conditions as many other mosques in Norway, i'm looking into the relationship between Islamic and Norwegian architecture. I want to understand better how mosques can be designed and developed to answer the challenge of segregation in the future.

My vision is to explore the potential of architecture in rethinking the role and presence of the Mosque in the Norwegian context. Not only as a spiritual space but also a hub for cultural activity that brings communities together under one umbrella. A Mosque that meets both the needs of the user (Muslim communities) recognizes the identity and history of the context (Oslo, Norway), and creates a bridge between Islamic culture and heritage with other communities in the Norwegian society.

I have chosen to work with one of Norway's largest Mosques (Rabita) in the city center of Oslo, near one of busiest streets in area, Torggata and only a few minute's walk from Oslo central station. The current mosque is in an old industrial building from 1860. The building is in terrible shape according profositionals, like many other mosques in Norway. This is planned to be demolished and A new building is currently being planned for this site...

Hausmannskvartalene



The Hausmann area is a district northeast of central Oslo that consists of the Hausmann quarters, the fifteen quarters south of Hausmanns gate were built from the 1860s. From this time, the district has had a mixture of dwellings, offices, houses of worship, schools, and other institutions, dining and entertainment venues and premises for voluntary organizations, a typical mix of the city center, where rental prices have been fairly low. The main street is Torggata, which runs from Stortorvet past Youngstorget to Ankertorget.

The Hausmann area is flat, rectangular and about five hundred meters across in both directions and contains:

- Niche shops, cafes, restaurants, nightclubs and hairdressers
- Premises for organizations
- Apartments and offices

The Hausmann quarters are still an area for congregations: such as various churches, a Jewish museum and the Rabita mosque.



Open Diverse Visible


Three key factors in my Project:

Research



Keywords from the research were safety, place of worship, community, open up for non-muslim, and creating dialogue.






S A C R E D Space


